

"Lead Me in the Path of Your Commandments For I Delight In It" by Peter J. Weller

In the February lessons, we find a thought-provoking contrast between verses from Psalm 119 and Jesus' sermon on the Mount recorded in Matthew. The Psalmist proclaims his love of the Law and his delight in obeying and keeping the Lord's statutes. Matthew records Jesus probing for the deeper meanings of the Law, saying that it is not enough to merely obey the letter of the law, but to understand its spirit and all of its ramifications as well as the wider applications of the Law.

The Psalmist writes: "Happy are those whose way is blameless, who walk in the law of the LORD. Happy are those who keep his decrees, who seek him with their whole heart, and who do no wrong, but walk in his ways. . . . Teach me O LORD, the way of your statutes, and I will observe it to the end. Give me understand that I may keep your law and observe it with my whole heart. Lead me in the path of your commandments, for I delight in it. . . . Oh, how I love your law!" (Psalm 119:1-1-2, 33-35, 44, 97) The psalmist expresses joy in his knowledge and love of the law, and he is willing to follow it in every way.

Who among us possesses such passion for and total commitment to understanding and keeping the law? Many feel constrained by the law and look for ways around it, for exceptions, for loopholes. Those obeying merely the letter of the law rather than its spirit, and meeting just the minimum requirements of the law, then congratulate themselves on being "law-abiding." As Paul so aptly put it, "For through the law comes knowledge of sin." (Romans 3:20)




To those who rang bells for the Salvation Army,

"Lead Me in the Path of Your Commandments For I Delight In It" by Peter J. Weller


This month's gospel lessons from Matthew's fifth chapter explore the meaning and significance of obeying the Law and being "good," or "righteous." Jesus makes a series of statements that begin, "You have heard that it was said, ______. 'But I say, '_____. '" Jesus extends the applications of the Law to new but related situations that require much higher moral and ethical standards be met to comply with the Law. For example, Jesus said, "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, do not resist an evildoer. But, if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give him your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile. Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you." (Matthew 5:38-42)

This goes against every human instinct, and humans generally want the opposite of what Jesus is saying. They want revenge. They want justice. They want thieves punished. They do not want beggars or frivolous lawsuits. They want the righteous vindicated and the unrighteous condemned. Yet, Jesus sets the higher standard: Love your enemies, turn the other cheek, pluck out the eye that causes you to sin, be perfect as your heavenly father is perfect.

Jesus also said, "I have not come to abolish [the law or the prophets] but to fulfill. For truly I tell you, until heaven and earth pass away, not one letter, not one stroke of a letter will pass away until all is accomplished. . . . For I tell you, unless your righteousness exceeds that of the scribes and the Pharisees, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:17, 20)

This can seem very deflating. How can anyone be that good, that moral, or that righteous? In our human condition, are we being set up to fail? The answer is "No." We must remember that Jesus, God's Son, was sacrificed so that our sins were forgiven, that belief in him will bring us eternal life, that if we but ask, all manner of good things will be given to us from our heavenly father. "Ask," said Jesus, "and it will be given to you; search and you will find; knock and it will be opened for you. For everyone who asks receives, and everyone who searches finds, and for everyone who knocks, the door will be opened." (Matthew 7:7-8) So, while the psalmist loves the law and lives to obey it, Jesus reminds us to look beyond the letter of the law, understand its spirit, and before all other things, seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness.

Sarah's first son, Mark, was a happy baby. But as he grew into his toddler years, Sarah was unsure how to handle his behavioral changes. When he started acting out at home, she felt herself growing more frustrated. Sarah knew she needed help. That's when she turned to LSI's Parents as Teachers program. Parents as Teachers provides free and voluntary parent education and support for families in Boone and Story County, with children up to age 5.

The program was with Sarah every step of the way, providing home visits, introducing her to community support groups, and teaching her how to adjust to Mark's developmental stages. "With help from Parents as Teachers, I learned his behavior was just a phase, and they told me it was normal," Sarah says. "Before, I thought there was a problem with me, or that I wasn't a good parent." Mark, now 3, entered preschool last fall, and Sarah is proud to see how much progress he has made. He's meeting new friends and at home, he's become the best big brother to his baby sister, Hannah. Learning how to handle Mark's developmental stages has made Sarah more confident in raising Hannah. She knows what to expect as Hannah grows up, and she's ready to face each day and create the brightest future for her children. "Parents as Teachers helped me so much with my parenting," Sarah says. "The program is the best thing I have."

12 Hours of Prayer

Lent is a time for us to fast, be in prayer, and repent as we realign ourselves and renew our commitment to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Do many of us really take the time to be silent and listen for the quiet whispers of the Holy Spirit? Many times, prayer is a self-absorbed, a laundry list of our wants (with stipulations attached) that we bring to God to fulfill. We are going to begin the season of Lent with an opportunity to be in prayer. We are going to give ourselves the gift and freedom to be quiet and be alone in the presence of God. On Ash Wednesday, **March 1st** someone will be in the sanctuary, in prayer for **1 hour**, **beginning at 5:00 a.m.** The Bible, candles, the church's photo directory, prayer books, and a tabletop labyrinth (paper) will all be available to you as you spend your hour in prayer. Sign up for an hour (beginning at 5:00 a.m. and concluding at 5:00 p.m.) of prayer in the sanctuary and open yourself up to the power of God; you'll be glad you did. Ash Wednesday is March 1st

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the season of penance and reflection that prepares us to celebrate Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The ashes we receive on our forehead, in the shape of a cross, are an outward sign of our sinfulness and need for repentance. They also symbolize our mortality, a reminder that one day we will die and our bodies will return to dust. Pastor Howard quotes Genesis 3:19, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return: to each person as they receive the ashes. With ashes upon our forehead we return to God's mercy and grace. Immanuel Lutheran's Ash Wednesday service, with the imposition of ashes and Holy Communion, will be at 6:00 p.m.; plan to attend this special worship service as we observe the beginning of the Lenten season.
