## "Therefore His Faith 'Was Reckoned To Him As Righteousness." by Peter J. Weller

A selection from Romans, Chapter 4 is one of the New Testament lessons for February. "For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law, but through the righteousness of faith. If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation.

"For this reason, it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law, but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations,' ) in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls in existence the things that do not exist. Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations,' according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him,' were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification." (Romans 4:13-25)

In these verses, we find Paul's quintessential argument regarding salvation by grace through faith. He plainly states that the promise that Abraham or his descendants would inherit the world "did not come through the law, but through the righteousness of faith." (Romans 4:13)





Healing through Harmony Jaden doesn't have many memories of his father. When Jaden was 5 years old, his father unexpectedly passed away. Now 14, Jaden has grown up without that loving connection. Through his grief, his connection to his mother became strained, and he struggled to manage his anger at home. After being placed in LSI's Bremwood Residential Treatment Center in Waverly, Jaden connected with LSI's Spiritual Life program. The voluntary program connects youth with faith-based art, music, and film. It serves as a safe space for children to open up about their emotions and get the support they need to thrive. "Jaden is one of the few kids who would actively set up lunch appointments with me," says Pastor Dennis Bauer, who leads the program. "He's really benefitted from being able to talk during the day." Having access to a support network and a trusting relationship with Pastor Dennis has helped Jaden feel empowered to make a positive change during his time at Bremwood. Jaden is finding his faith through music, and he's learning how to talk about his trauma and become a role model for other Iowa youth. Jaden has now been adopted into a loving family. As he finishes up his treatment at Bremwood, his family visits frequently and worships with him, and Jaden is enjoying being a new big brother.

Such inheritance is not a reward for right behavior or for scrupulously following the law or for "being good," but rather it is because of belief and faith in God and God's promises. Abraham never wavered in his faith. He believed that whatever God said God would do, God would, in fact, do it, improbable as it might seem. If God said to him that he would become the father of many nations, then it would become so, regardless of his, and Sarah's, old age.

Paul goes on to say that God's promise to Abraham was not just to him, but also to all of his descendants. And, by extension, that would include us. Paul writes that Abraham's faith "was reckoned to him as righteousness," and he writes further that these words "were written not for his sake alone, but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for our justification." (Romans 4:22-25) It is through our belief in Jesus Christ as God's son, and that he was crucified for us and for our sins and trespasses, that God's grace is lavished upon us.

John said much the same thing in his gospel. He wrote, "But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God. . . . From his fulness we have all received grace upon grace. The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ." (John 1:12-18) In describing in his third chapter, Jesus' encounter with Nicodemus at night, John quoted Jesus in his memorable 16th verse: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life." (John 3:16)

Verse 17 and those following are equally important: "Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." Indeed, the world is saved through him, and through him, we gain access to God's amazing grace. Considering this then, we can only express gratitude and appreciation to Almighty God for such a gift, and also express deep humility that such grace would be showered on us.

### Lent: What is it? Why is it?

The highlight of the year for Christians is Easter, the day when our Lord rose from the dead. Lent is a forty-day (not counting six Sundays in Lent) season of preparation for Easter. It always begins on a Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, six and one-half weeks before Easter. It ends on Holy Saturday, the last day of Holy Week, which immediately precedes Easter Sunday.

"Lent" is an Old English world for spring, the season when the days lengthen. Why 40 days? We remember the 40 days in the ark surrounded by water, the 40 years the Israelites wandered in the wilderness for purification, the 40 days that Jesus fasted and was tempted in the wilderness, and the 40 days of preparation for Easter baptisms. During Lent God's people: fast, pray, demonstrate acts of love, and long for the baptismal waters of Easter – our spiritual rebirth. Lent is not required anywhere in scripture, but a custom Christians have practiced for most of the last two thousand years.

The color used in the sanctuary is purple, a color which symbolized both the pain and suffering leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus as well as the suffering of humanity and the world under sin. Purple is also the color of royalty and so anticipates, through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection and hope of newness that will be celebrated in Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday. Simply put, Lent is a time to carefully examine our relationship with God and for spiritual renewal.

Pastor Howard invites you to a discipline of making the sign of the cross upon your forehead with God's baptismal water. Remind yourself that through your baptism you are a claimed, beloved child of God and an inheritor of all of God's promises through Jesus Christ.

#### 12 Hours of Prayer

Lent is a time for us to fast, be in prayer, and repent as we realign ourselves and renew our commitment to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Do many of us really take the time to be silent and listen for the quiet whispers of the Holy Spirit? Many times, prayer is a self-absorbed, a laundry list of our wants (with stipulations attached) that we bring to God to fulfill. We are going to begin the season of Lent with an opportunity to be in prayer. We are going to give ourselves the gift and freedom to be quiet and be alone in the presence of God. On **Ash Wednesday, February 14th** someone will be in the sanctuary, in prayer for **1 hour, beginning at 5:00 a.m.** The Bible, candles, the church's photo directory, prayer books, and a tabletop labyrinth (paper) will all be available to you as you spend your hour in prayer. Sign up for an hour (beginning at 5:00 a.m. and concluding at 5:00 p.m.) of prayer in the sanctuary and open yourself up to the power of God; you'll be glad you did. If you have any questions, contact Pastor Howard.

#### Ash Wednesday is February 14th

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the season of penance and reflection that prepares us to celebrate Christ's' Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The ashes we receive on our forehead, in the shape of a cross, are an outward sign of our sinfulness and need for repentance. They also symbolize our mortality, a




reminder that one-day we will die and our bodies will return to dust. Pastor Howard quotes Genesis 3:19, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return: to each person as they receive the ashes. With ashes upon our forehead we return to God's mercy and grace. Immanuel Lutheran's **Ash Wednesday service**, with the imposition of ashes and Holy Communion, will be at **6:00 p.m.**; plan to attend this special worship service as we observe the beginning of the Lenten season.

### **First Communion Retreat**

All children in the 2nd grade, along with their parent(s)/guardian(s), will participate in a First Communion retreat. This retreat will be held on Saturday, March 24th (1 p.m. – 5 p.m.). As part of the learning experience, the children will prepare the Communion bread to be used during worship on Palm and Easter Sundays. 


