

"Whoever Has the Son Has Life" by Peter J. Weller

Two of the Second Lesson selections for May come from the fifth chapter of John's first letter. As was mentioned in last month's column, this was a time in the early Church's history where misconceptions began to develop regarding Jesus' divinity, whether he was the Son of God, or that he came to earth in the flesh. And, those who believed these misconceptions began to pull away from the Church. In this letter, John encourages those who remain in the Church to believe that their confession of the earthly Jesus as the Christ and Son of God is true.

John writes of Jesus: "This is the one who came by water and the blood, Jesus Christ, not with water only but with the water and the blood. And the Spirit is the one that testifies, for the Spirit is the truth. There are three that testify: the Spirit and the water and the blood, and these three agree. If we receive human testimony, the testimony of God is greater; for this is the testimony of God that he has testified to his Son. Those who believe in the Son of God have the testimony in their hearts. Those who do not believe in God have made him a liar by not believing in the testimony that God has given concerning his Son. And this is the testimony: God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life.

"I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life." (I John 5:7-13)

In his letter, John builds his case for why Jesus should be believed to be the Christ, the Son of God. He knows that under Torah law, three witnesses are needed to establish his case. Regarding witness or testimony, Torah law says: "A single witness shall not suffice to convict a person of any wrongdoing in connection with any offense that may be committed. Only on the evidence of two or three witnesses shall a charge be sustained." (Deuteronomy 19:15). That is why John writes, "There are three that testify: the Spirit and the water and the blood, and these three agree." (I John 5:7-8) It is believed that here the water refers to the water of baptism, the blood refers to Jesus' death on the cross, and the Spirit refers to God's Holy Spirit.

There is a DIRE need for peanut butter!! It's protein month at Immanuel!!



"LSI has been a Lifesaver"

No parent should feel alone or hopeless when it comes to caring for their children's health. But those emotions were common for Judy four years ago. It started when her son began seeing a litany of different doctors and specialists. Judy needed to coordinate his many appointments and medications, but it was difficult to keep track while still caring for her three other children as a single parent. Judy found LSI's Pediatric Integrated Health services, which were a shoulder for her to lean on. Judy's LSI worker, Wyndolyn, coordinated medical appointments and counseling sessions. When Judy's daughter required an Individualized Education Program (IEP) at school, Wyndolyn was there to keep in contact with the school and attend IEP meetings with Judy. When Judy's child began attending school at LSI's Bremwood Residential Treatment Center, Wyndolyn checked on him and provided updates to Judy. Wyndolyn also helped Judy to set up respite care through LSI's Services for People with Disabilities. Now, Judy can get a much-needed break while her children receive quality care from an LSI respite provider. "We're one team now, we're on the same page," Judy says. "LSI has been a backbone for me when I wanted to give up. Wyndolyn talks to me when I'm stressed and ready to call it quits. She's really an advocate for my family. LSI has been a lifesaver."

But, John goes on to say, ". . . the testimony of God is greater" than human testimony, and God "has testified to his Son." (I John 5:9) And further, ". . . God gave us eternal life, and this life is in his Son. Whoever has the Son has life. . . ." (I John 5:11-12) And, John concludes this section of his letter by saying, "I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life." (I John 5:13)

John can say these things because he witnessed Jesus' ministry on earth. Often in his gospel, he quotes Jesus as saying, "I am in the father and the father is in me." "I and the father are one." "If you have seen me, you have seen the father." Doubtless, he had heard Jesus say things like this many times during his ministry. And unquestionably, he truly and fervently believed in his own heart that Jesus was who he said he was.

John did not write down everything that Jesus had said, but there is enough here to make the point that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God. At the end of his gospel, John wrote, "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (John 20:30-31) Referring to himself in the third person, John concludes his gospel by writing, "This is the disciple who is testifying these things and has written them, and we know that his testimony is true." (John 21:24)

Which then takes us back to John's first letter, where near the end of it he says, "I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life." John, in effect, is saying, "I have been with Jesus, I knew Jesus, and I still feel his presence. And, I want you to know that if you believe in him, as I believe in him, that you also will have eternal life, and you will know that for a certainty." In John's own words, he wrote, ". . .we know that the Son of God has come and has given us understanding so that we may know him who is true; and we are in him who is true, in his son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life." (I John 5:20)



Ascension of Our Lord; Thursday, May 10th



We often cast our eyes upward to look for God. When we are feeling lonely or misunderstood, we raise our hands to ask why, or shake our fists in gestures of prayer, anguish, or praise. While the scriptures promise that God is king of all the earth, sitting on his holy throne (Psalm 47), we need not only look up for God's action in our lives. Our ascended Lord lives in the heavens, but Jesus does not leave his disciples—or us—to fumble while he naps in the clouds. Before he ascends, Jesus promises that we are clothed with the Holy Spirit's power, witnesses "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). We look up to the skies for help, then return our gaze to those among us in need of our care, to the body of Christ and the wind of the Spirit among the baptized, preparing for the time when Jesus comes again to gather us in. 2018 Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly

The Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly, the primary decision-making body of the synod, will meet May 18-19, 2018 at the Coralville Marriott in Coralville, IA.

Each spring, synods gather in assembly to lift up and celebrate ministries and address the official business of the synod. The Assembly is this synod's





highest legislative authority, limited only by the constitution and bylaws of the synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, and the assembly's own resolutions. Assembly is also a cherished time when we gather from across the synod to reconnect with friends, meet new ones, and share what it means to be the body of Christ. The 2018 Synod Assembly's theme is **The Water** and **The Witness**, calls us to make the connection between the waters of our baptismal witness and the world's water-related need. Immanuel's voting members attending the Assembly are: Bev Bailey, Mike Howard, and Pastor Howard.

WEAR RED Pentecost - Sunday, May 20th (Wednesday, May 23rd)

Pentecost is a very important day in the church year. The name "Pentecost" comes from a Greek word meaning "fifty." It's fifty days after Easter and commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the early Christians. It's the birthday of the church! The color of the day is red, to remind us of the flames of fire that rested on each of them as they gathered together; "They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:3-4a). We thank God for giving us His Holy Spirit at our Baptism. "The Holy Spirit calls us through the Gospel, enlightens us with God's gifts, and sanctifies us and keeps us in true faith. In the same way the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it untied with Jesus Christ in the one true faith" (The Small Catechism by Martin Luther; the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed). Let's celebrate the birth of the church through the Holy Spirit at Pentecost by wearing red to worship!

Holy Trinity Sunday; May 27th (Wednesday, May 30th)

The doctrine of the Trinity invites us to consider how a God constituted by relationship—the Father with the Son, the Son with the Spirit, the Spirit with the Father—draws us into that relationship with God and one another. Gradually or suddenly, through the work of the Spirit, we come to know our belonging to the Father and to Christ's body. In such loving relationships, truth is discovered. But people cannot bear the truth all at once, so discipleship and faith formation are gradual processes of listening for the Spirit's voice. Christian practices such as worship, learning, and service are occasions for people of all ages to be "guided into truth." Such practices are rooted in baptism, in which God draws us into a lifelong relationship in which we grow into truth and love over time—guided by the Spirit, accompanied by Jesus, and having peace with the Father.

In Romans, we hear the truth of how love originates and grows in us: Poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, God's love gives us a hope that will never disappoint. Christian community offers the delightful opportunity to experience one's own growth in hope, faith, and love, and to witness others' growth as they too are drawn more deeply into relationship with the triune God.
