"But In Fact Christ Has Been Raised From the Dead" by Peter J. Weller

The New Testament lessons for February are all from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. And this column will focus on verses 12-20 where Paul advocates passionately for believing that Christ indeed was resurrected from the dead. He writes, "Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how can some of you say there is no resurrection of the dead? If there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised; and if Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation has been in vain and your faith has been in vain. We are even found to be misrepresenting God because we testified of God that he raised Christ—whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised. For if the dead are not raised, then Christ has not been raised. If Christ has not been raised, then your faith is futile and you are still in your sins. Then those who have also died in Christ have perished. If for this life only we have hoped in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied.

"But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died." (I Corinthians 15:12-20)

Paul's concerns about the issue of Christ's resurrection arose from two factors. First, Jews who were Sadducees did not believe in the resurrection of the dead. Second, Corinth was a Greek city and Christians there were heavily influenced by the Greek idea that the body was of this earth and mortal, while the soul would continue to exist beyond this life. The body, therefore, was something to be left behind gladly at death. Some Corinthian Christians, therefore, found it difficult to accept the idea of the resurrection of the body.

Paul addresses these issues in this letter. Earlier in Chapter 15 (vv. 5-8), Paul notes the people to whom Jesus appeared after his resurrection, "... he appeared to [Peter], then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers and sisters at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared to me."

Hector Cervantes, in a research paper submitted to Dr. Martin Sheldon of Liberty University, wrote, "Saul. . . became a staunch opponent of the movement Jesus started. Saul's mission was to squelch the idea that Jesus was the Messiah, along with persecuting the disciples of Jesus, viewing their message as heresy. . . . Yet, upon encountering the risen Christ (Acts 9) Saul's life, mission and even his name was changed.





"This experience of seeing the resurrected Jesus convinced Saul that the followers of Jesus were right: Jesus had been raised; he was "Son of God," "Lord," and "Christ" ("Messiah" in Hebrew). He would soon return, and he would save those who put their faith in him. Paul's encounter with the risen Christ was such a radical turning point for the Apostle that it motivated him to interpret Scripture through the person and work of Jesus Christ. . . . Paul believed a correct view of the resurrection of Christ is of the utmost importance, for there are eternal implications. What can be understood [is that] that the future hope of the believer rests in the resurrected Christ."

Unquestionably, Paul's encounter with the resurrected Jesus on the Road to Damascus had shaken him to his core. This was for him a God Moment of monumental proportions. He was definitely not the same person after this encounter that he was before. Based on his own experience, therefore, he simply could not accept the proposition that there is no resurrection from the dead. If that were the case, then Paul must have asked himself exactly what did he experience and whom did he see in that moment on the Road to Damascus? For him, the argument against the resurrection flew in the face of his own very intense personal experience and was simply unsupportable. In a series of statements in verses 12-20, Paul makes the case that the resurrection of Christ's body did occur, and that it is simply not tenable to believe otherwise:

"Now if Christ is proclaimed as raised from the dead, how do some among you say that there is no resurrection of the dead?" "But if there is no resurrection of the dead, then Christ has not been raised."

"If Christ has not been raised, then our proclamation is in vain, and your faith also is in vain."

"We are even found to be misrepresenting God because we testified of God that he raised Christ—whom he did not raise if it is true that the dead are not raised."

"For if the dead aren't raised, neither has Christ been raised."

"If Christ has not been raised, your faith is vain; you are still in your sins."

"Then they also who are fallen asleep in Christ have perished."

"If we have only hoped in Christ in this life, we are of all men most pitiable."

In our modern world, one might be tempted to look for a scientific explanation to Paul's encounter on the Damascus Road, and finding none, be further tempted to say that it never happened, or that Paul was mistaken or delusional, and the story is therefore not believable. Such a view, however, might very well be short-sighted. Paul certainly experienced something very significant and profound, and it created within him, an unshakeable belief in the resurrection and the resurrected Christ. He had no doubt in his mind that he had personally seen Jesus and was forever changed by that experience. He was passionate in his beliefs and did more to spread the gospel than any other person of his time. He was a prolific writer and author of thirteen books of the New Testament. His influence in shaping early Christian beliefs was enormous. And, in these verses in I Corinthians, he nails down convincingly the case that the resurrection is real: "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the first fruits of those who have died."
