See Miracles Life Everyday! "And Who Is My Neighbor?" by Peter J. Weller

We are all familiar with the parable of the Good Samaritan as told in the gospel of Luke. Looking at the verses that precede this parable, Luke writes: "Just then, a lawyer stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he said, 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?' [Jesus] said to him, 'What is written in the law? What do you read here?' He answered, 'You should love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all you strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as your self.' And he said to him, 'You have given the right answer; do this and you will live.'

"But wanting to justify himself, he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbor?' "Jesus responded by telling the parable, very familiar to all Christians, of the Good Samaritan, the story of a man traveling from Jerusalem to Jericho, set upon by robbers, severely beaten, stripped, and left half dead. A priest and a Levite passed by and rendered no assistance. But a Samaritan tended to his wounds, took him to an inn, and arranged for the innkeeper to care for this man until he returned and paid all expenses owed.

Jesus then asked the lawyer, "Which of these three, do you think, was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" He responded, "The one who showed him mercy." Jesus then said, "Go and do Likewise." (Luke 10:25-37)

In this story, Jesus descries a situation where a victim needs help desperately, and two people, who clearly should be the ones to help failed to do so. Instead, an outcaste renders the aid necessary for this victim's survival. In fairness, under the Law, as holy men, priests were not to touch a dead or dying body, for that would make them impure, and they would have to undergo a cleansing process of seven days during which they would not be able to perform any priestly duties. Which is why the priest may have chosen not to act.

Ranking second to priests in Jewish religious life, Levites assumed secondary roles in the life and worship of the Jerusalem temple. Often, they were also experts of the Law, which might have factored into the Levite's decision not to act. Possibly, that is why Jesus chose to include a Levite in this parable since he was speaking to a lawyer.

Through the program, adults with disabilities or "mentees" move from a supported community living setting – like a 24-hour, fully staffed home with roommates – into a private family home with a Host Homes "mentor". LSI collaborates with the individuals we serve and the contracted mentors to ensure each match is the perfect fit and to create a shared living opportunity that is beneficial to mentors and mentees. The Best Kind of Bond

Amanda needed a change. For years, she had received 24-hour care, living in a busy home with three roommates. But she was lashing out and becoming aggressive, and she required multiple psychiatric hospital visits throughout the year to receive mental health treatment. She and her dad, Bruce, knew she needed more one-on-one attention to thrive. They turned to LSI's new Host Homes program. Through LSI's Services for People with Disabilities, the program allows adults with disabilities to transition from supported community living to a private family home where they build positive, lasting relationships with a specially selected mentor instead of a team of staff members. Soon, Amanda was matched with Mavis, an LSI Host Homes mentor. On the day Mavis and Amanda first met, they clicked. And a year later, the family hasn't looked back. Instead of several emergency calls and incidents each year, Amanda has gone over a year without any mental health hospitalization. Mavis has spent the last year collaborating with Amanda to find the best way for her to communicate her emotions. She wants Amanda to know her voice and thoughts are heard. "Mavis has helped in every way," Bruce says. "She cares, she's loving, she's patient, and she's getting Amanda engaged in art classes and hobbies she loves. I have a happier daughter now."

Jews and Samaritans hated each other. The animosity between these two groups began after the exiled Jews returned from the Babylonian Captivity. Samaritans, who remained behind during the exile, intermarried with newcomers moving in to colonize the area, and the returning Jews looked upon them as "halfbreeds." Though Samaritans believed in the Torah (the first five books of the Bible), they did not accept the writings of the other prophets, and they worshipped at Mt. Gerizim rather than in Jerusalem.

Thus, we have the irony where the only possible choice to the question, "Which of these three do you think was a neighbor to the man who fell into the hands of the robbers?" is the one that the lawyer chose when he answered, "The one who showed him mercy."

Luke tells us that the lawyer seemed to want more of an answer from Jesus. In law, definitions of terms are extremely important. Our laws today contain definitions of words or terms to help us determine the law's intent. One can easily criticize the lawyer for being too self-righteous in asking the question, "And who is my neighbor?" Perhaps, in his lawyer's mind, he sought clarification. Or, perhaps, as Luke wrote, he sought to justify himself.

Our society today abounds with similar ironies. How many problems do we "pass by" or look the other way because "those people" are undeserving of the help that they are asking for. Whether one talks of "welfare" or "Medicare for all" or "lock 'em up" or "they don't deserve any better," the parable of the Good Samaritan thus speaks to us. Who are our neighbors? How well do we address the hurts and the wrongs and the injustices that they have suffered? What would Jesus have to say to us about how we treat "the least of these, my brothers and sisters"?

Neighbors are not just our friends and acquaintances, the people next door or down the street. In Jesus' view, our neighbors also live on "the wrong side of the tracks," in the ghettos, in the "hollers", on the reservations, under bridges and in shacks, often out of sight, unnoticed, and in obscurity. There are people in real need in those places, and Jesus does not ask if they are deserving enough, if they will become dependent on aid or handouts, or if this is a waste of taxpayers' money. What he does say is, "Address the need."

There are plenty of needs to be addressed. There is much in American society that needs improvement. Jesus does say to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, minister to those who are sick or in prison. It is time to assess what needs to be done, how can we make America better for all of its citizens, undeserving or not, and then roll up our sleeves and get to work.
