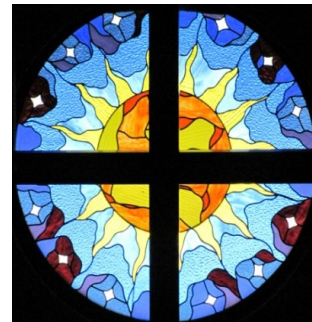

“I Will Confess My Transgressions to the LORD,
and You Forgave the Guilt Of My Sin ”

In the opening verses of Psalm 32, David writes, “Happy are those whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered. Happy are those to whom the LORD imputes no iniquity, and in whose spirit there is no deceit.

“While I kept silence, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long. For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer.

“Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I said, ‘I will confess my transgressions to the LORD,’ and you forgave the guilt of my sin.

“Therefore let all who are faithful offer prayer to you; at a time of distress, the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them. You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with glad cries of deliverance” (Psalm 32:1-7)

It is believed that David wrote this psalm after his encounter with Bathsheba, the wife of Uriah, and after he had slept with her. Bathsheba became pregnant by David, which he then tried to cover up. He sent Bathsheba's husband, Uriah, into battle, where subsequent orders to withdraw were not sent to Uriah, leaving him exposed to the enemy, who killed him. After Uriah's death, David married Bathsheba. For a while he did not ask God to forgive him, and all during that while, he was guilt-ridden and unhappy. His friend, the prophet Nathan, confronted David about his sins of both adultery with Bathsheba and engineering Uriah's murder. Realizing the enormity of these sins, David confessed them to God and told God how sorry he was. God forgave him, which provided David much relief and comfort. Repentance is the way to say to God we are sorry for our sins. There are seven Repentance Psalms in addition to Psalm 32. They are 6, 38, 51, 102, 130, and 143.

Looking at these first seven verses of Psalm 32 above, one can see and understand how and why David came to realize the need to confess these sins to God. The first word of the psalm, “Happy,” has also been translated as “Blessed.” As I have written before, David knew God intimately, as also, certainly, did God know David. And, I might add, as God certainly knows each one of us. And, David came to God in faith, hoping and believing that God in his great compassion would listen and understand and grant forgiveness to him.

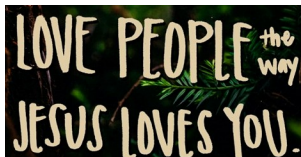

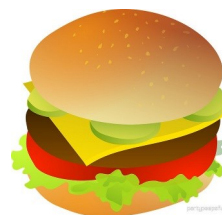

A Growing Family

Lindsey and Andrea were no strangers to foster parenting. Their older brother fostered children for 10 years, and they were inspired by his drive and passion for supporting vulnerable children. Until recently, they hadn't seen themselves as foster parents. But something in their hearts told them they were needed. "It's been on our hearts for a lot of years, and we have the room and love," Andrea says. "It's something we knew we could do and it's needed." The two sisters decided to become licensed foster parents earlier this year through LSI Foster Care and Adoption. Now, they are caring for children in foster care at the same time. Lindsey and Andrea regularly meet up to support one another and ensure the children can connect and feel less alone during the most vulnerable time in their young lives. "It's been so important to have a connection to another foster family," Lindsey says. "The kids can see they're not different. There are other children in their same situation." Meanwhile, they are busy building a strong bond with the children's birth families. Lindsey says foster parenting is a way for them to give a child stability while also nurturing their whole family. Lindsey and Andrea have also found support from other local foster families. They are there for each other, offering a shoulder to lean on when anyone needs an extra boost on the difficult days. "There is a need for foster families in Iowa, and there is so much good that comes out of fostering," Andrea says.

Experiencing guilt is a part of the human condition. One feels guilt when having done something wrong against, or caused harm toward, one or more person or persons or toward society as a whole. The consequences of an action can be either intentional or unintentional. Generally, when one realizes they have caused these consequences, they will either face them and apologize and admit guilt and try to make amends, or they will deny them and/or try to keep the consequences hidden as effectively as possible. These actions can range from simple misunderstandings to major crimes or catastrophic events. Those harmed may involve just one other person or a group of persons or society as a whole, generally.

Sin, on the other hand, is the transgression against the laws of God. It is rebellion against God, a turning of one's back on God. Furthermore, one does feel guilt for having sinned. And, these two concepts, guilt and sin, unite the religious world and the secular world together. In the case of David, above, his actions violated ancient Hebrew religious law as found in the Ten Commandments. But, many would find his actions inconsistent with contemporary secular law, also.

Yet, David is the king, and we find ourselves faces the age-old question, is the king above the law? Nathan confronts David, and David's eyes are opened to the consequences of his actions. Perhaps, in his own mind, David had already realized these consequences and that he had to own up to them. He may have already been weighed down by guilt, which might help to explain why he wrote, "While I kept silence, my body wasted away through my groaning all day long. For day and night your hand was heavy upon me; my strength was dried up as by the heat of summer. Then I acknowledged my sin to you, and I said, 'I will confess my transgressions to the LORD,' and you forgave the guilt of my sin."

David realizes the size and the scope and the depth of God's grace and of the gift that God has given him. He feels fortunate and humbled and grateful to be the recipient of God's forgiveness. So, he writes, "Therefore let all who are faithful offer prayer to you [O Lord]; at a time of distress, the rush of mighty waters shall not reach them. You [Lord] are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with glad cries of deliverance." The grace and forgiveness that God granted to David, God will also grant to each of us.

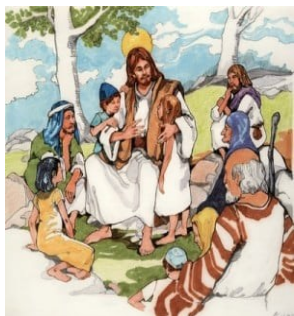


ELCA Good Gifts Advent Tree

2020 Bishop's Election



The current bishop of the Southeastern Iowa Synod, Michael Burk, has announced that he will not be available for reelection at the end of his term in 2020. A new bishop will be elected at the synod assembly May 1-3, 2020, in Coralville. The election of a new bishop is a process by which a "pastor of the synod" is called. It is similar to the process a congregation undertakes when calling a new pastor. One of the first steps of this process was the formation of the synod's ministry site profile, which is available online. It gives an overview of the landscape of this synod based on what survey participants have said about our

life and ministry together. As we continue this process together as the Southeastern Iowa Synod, we ask for your help by praying for the synod and its congregations as we undertake the process and praying for the people who are discerning the call to be bishop. 2019 Proposed Constitution

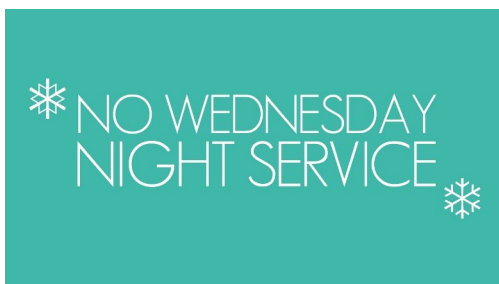
Immanuel's committees and council have been prayerfully reviewing Immanuel's current Constitution. Changes have been proposed to better reflect the ministries of Immanuel and how Immanuel performs the business of being church. Hard copies of the 2019 proposed Immanuel Lutheran Constitution are on the hall table. Proposed additions are highlighted in yellow, proposed deletions are noted as a strikeout. The proposed Constitution will be adopted at the Annual Meeting on Sunday, November 10th. Please pick up a copy for your review.

Roof Vote

A special congregational meeting was held on Wednesday, October 9th and reconvened on Sunday, October 13th for the purpose of approving/declining the acquisition of a \$50,000 loan to put a new roof on the sanctuary and fellowship hall. The vote was unanimous to **approve** the acquisition of the loan. The loan will become part of the mortgage and will not increase the monthly payments. The loan has been secured, the materials have been ordered, and the roof should take three days to complete. Immanuel's sanctuary and fellowship hall will have a new roof in a little over a month's time (depending upon weather). Thank you for supporting this needed project on the building. The ministries of Immanuel will not be hampered.

Washington Against Hunger

Join the Washington community for the Washington Against Hunger Food Packaging Event on **Sunday, November 24th, 3 p.m.**, at **KC Hall**. This has become an annual event overseen by the Washington Area Ministerial Association. The food packaging is through Take Away Hunger a non-profit organization which packages a specialized rice-based, soy mixture which is used locally and overseas. One packaging team, consisting of 10 – 12 volunteers, will package approximately 1,728 meals in about 45 minutes at a cost of .25 cents per meal for a total of \$432.00. Since January 2018, Take Away Hunger has packaged over 941,500 meals. Mark your calendars, you will feed the hungry and show the love of Jesus. Synod Book Club

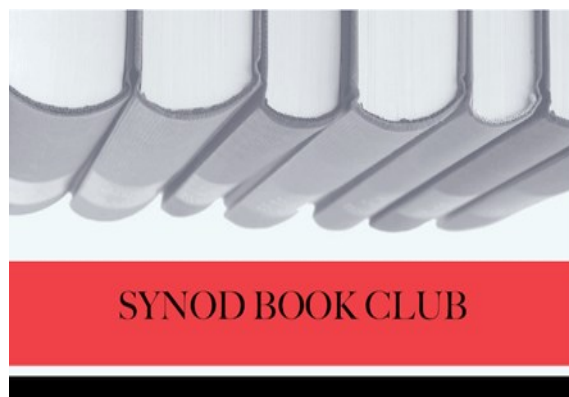
