

The text for this month's column comes from Jeremiah: "The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand and led them out of the land of Egypt— a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts, and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, 'Know the LORD,' for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more." (Jeremiah 31:31-34)

Dr. Dennis Olson, Professor of Old Testament Theology at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, New Jersey, wrote in Working Preacher, "The book of Jeremiah is dominated by doom and gloom, condemning the people of Judah for their great sin and announcing the imminent destruction of the nation and the exile to Babylon that would come in 587 BCE." Yet, midway through this 52-chapter book, one finds these above-written verses. Essentially, Jeremiah intended to explain to the Jews in exile in Babylon that this disaster of exile was God's response to Israel's pagan worship. Yet, in spite of God's anger, Jeremiah records God's willingness to start over with a new covenant and a new relationship with God's people.

Dr. Olson continues, "In the midst of this dark valley of despair and judgment in the book of Jeremiah, however, a dense cluster of promise oracles concentrated in Jeremiah 30-33 radiate . . . with bright promises of hope, comfort and restoration. These four chapters proclaim that after the judgment of exile is over, God will indeed bring God's people back to the land of Judah and restore them as a new and faithful people once again. [This] passage from Jeremiah 31:31-34 is a key element of a new future that only God can create."

The Babylonian exile lasted about seventy years (608-538 BCE) These dates are approximate, depending on one's choice of starting and ending events. Psalm 137 speaks to this exile and captivity: "By the rivers of Babylon we sat and wept when we remembered Zion. . . . our captors asked us for songs, our tormentors demanded songs of joy; they said, 'Sing us one of the songs of Zion!'

### A Path to Healing

When 14-year-old Bri first came to LSI's Beloit Residential Treatment Center in Ames, she was struggling with aggression, frequently ran away, and had a hard time focusing in school. And as she was trying to heal from years of trauma, Bri's beloved grandpa suddenly passed away. She felt stuck and nothing was getting better, no matter what she tried. But her Beloit team was there to cheer her on. The LSI team at Beloit provides 24-7 mental health treatment for Iowa children who have often experienced years of trauma, abuse, or neglect. Staff members are there to encourage children on their path to hope and healing, and they were there to lift up Bri when she decided to make a positive change in her life. Bri began actively participating in individual and group therapy sessions provided at Beloit, and she made it a point to encourage her peers on campus every day. Her Beloit team helped her to feel more comfortable opening up about her grief, and staff members were there to remind her of all the progress she had made to help her stay focused on the positives.

After months of hard work, Bri found a loving foster family and was able to leave Beloit's programming. And while she felt uncertain and anxious about leaving, she knew she was ready to move forward. Bri continues to keep in touch with the team at Beloit, providing details on her new life, school, and her new room at home. Bri's anxiety about the unknown has diminished, she feels confident communicating her emotions, and she has hope for the future.

"How can we sing the songs of the Lord while in a foreign land? . . . May my tongue cling to the roof of my mouth if I do not remember [Jerusalem], if I do not consider Jerusalem my highest joy.

"Remember, Lord, what the Edomites did on the day Jerusalem fell. 'Tear it down,' they cried, 'tear it down to its foundations!' Daughter Babylon, doomed to destruction, happy is the one who repays you according to what you have done to us. Happy is the one who seizes your infants and dashes them against the rocks." One can feel the sense of loss, the rising anger, the desire for revenge, reprisal, and retribution expressed here by the psalmist.

Getting back to the verses in Jeremiah, notice here that God takes the initiative. God speaks through the prophet: "I will make a new covenant." "I will put my law within them." "I will be their God." "I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more."

Dr. Kathryn Schifferdecker, Professor of Old Testament at Luther Seminary in Saint Paul, Minnesota, wrote in Working Preacher, "The themes of a new (or renewed) covenant and of God's overwhelming grace are, of course, fitting for a celebration of Reformation Day. Martin Luther did not believe that he had discovered something radically new in Scripture when he found there the doctrine of salvation by grace through faith. He rediscovered a treasure that the church of his day had largely lost. The movement he began was as much a restoration as a reformation — the rediscovery of God's abundant grace in the new covenant established in and through Jesus Christ. Luther was restoring the church to a right understanding of that covenant.

"There is, then, in Luther's theology a deep continuity with what had come before. Luther knew that God's nature does not change. God was, is, and will continue to be a God of great mercy, forgiveness, and love for a wayward people. It is that people's (the church's) understanding of God's nature that had become clouded in Luther's day. Like Jeremiah, then, Luther called the people of his day to a new understanding of God and a renewed emphasis on God's grace and God's abiding love even for a sinful people.

"And it is all God's doing. In and through Jesus Christ, the God of Jeremiah continues to forgive, renew, reform, and call God's people into right relationship with him and with one another. God is faithful, even when we are not. That is the good news that both Jeremiah and Luther proclaimed, and it is news that can and should be celebrated on this Reformation Sunday, preferably with trumpets and always with great joy." To which I can only add, "Indeed!"



### **October Bulletins**

Immanuel will be using a different bulletin during the month of October. To fully participate in live streaming or conference call of worship download the October bulletin from Immanuel's website "luthwash.org". The bulletin is located at the "October Bulletin" tab. The October bulletin has different hymns, the weekly scripture texts, Blessing of Lutheran World Relief quilts, school kits, baby care kits, personal care kits (October 11th), the Holy Communion liturgy (October 11th), Baptisms (October 18th), and Baptism (October 25th).

A different bulletin will be used for our outdoor worship on **Sundays, October 11th and 25th,** 4 p.m. The bulletin for the outdoor service will also be available at Immanuel's website luthwash.org for you to download. No bulletins will be printed and available for you during this afternoon worship. Outdoor worship will be cancelled if raining.

# A quick glance at Outdoor Worship Dates; 4 p.m.: October 11th and 25th November 8th and 22nd

Outdoor worship will be on the East Lawn during favorable temperatures. Once it is too cold to sit outdoors, worship will be moved to the parking lot where you will remain in your cars. Outdoor worship will be cancelled if raining.

### Car Hop Communion: Sunday, October 11th

Pastor Howard will be serving Holy Communion on Sunday, October 11th, 11:30 a.m. - Noon under the portico in the church's parking lot. 56 people where nourished with the presence of Christ at the Car Hop Communion on Sunday, September 13th.

Pastor Howard will consecrate the elements (wafers, wine, and grape juice) during the live stream/conference call worship, 9 a.m. Pastor Howard will be wearing a face shield when consecrating the elements and during distribution. The common cup will not be available only individual, plastic cups. Cars will enter the parking lot through the North entrance and exit through the West entrance. Pastor Howard will give you Holy Communion while you remain in your cars. You will then drive to the garbage can and throw away your plastic cup(s). However, if you chose not to participate in this meal opportunity, fasting is still an appropriate option.

Communion is served under the portico in the church's parking lot, regardless of the weather.

### Wear RED on Sunday, October 25th

Reformation Sunday is October 25<sup>th</sup> and we remember our Lutheran heritage when Martin Luther nailed his 95 theses to the church door over 500 years ago. The reformation lasted between the years 1517 and 1546. "After Luther's death Luther's followers struggled with questions that threatened to split the evangelical movement. Fifty years after the presentation of the Augsburg Confession, they drafted a solution to those questions and pointed to other writings that defined what they believed. This Formula of Concord and those writings were published as *The Book of Concord* (1580) and form the core of Lutheran teaching and shape its preaching."\* Pastor Howard has a copy of *The Book of Concord* if you would like to look at it. Let's wear **red** on Reformation Day to celebrate our Lutheran roots! Take a photo of yourself/family wearing **red** on the 25<sup>th</sup> and post them on Immanuel's Facebook page! We're Lutheran's together even if we are worshiping apart.

### What are the qualities of an Immanuel Lutheran Council Leader?

After the Ecclesiastical ballots are received, the nominating committee prayerfully discerns the calling of the Holy Spirit's work from the names submitted. The nominating committee uses the guidelines in Immanuel's Constitution C12.04 to discern the Holy Spirit's calling. The following is the section in Immanuel's Constitution the nominating committee uses:

C12.04. The Congregation Council shall have general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The duties of the Congregation Council shall include the following:

To lead this congregation in stating its mission, to do long-range planning, to set goals and priorities, and to evaluate its activities in light of its mission and goals.

To seek to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service, and support.

- To oversee and provide for the administration of this congregation to enable it to fulfill its functions and perform its mission.
- To maintain supportive relationships with the rostered minister(s) and staff and help them annually to evaluate the fulfillment of their calling or employment. To be examples individually and corporately of the style of life and ministry expected of all baptized persons.
- To promote a congregational climate of peace and goodwill, and, as differences and conflicts arise, to endeavor to foster mutual understanding.
- To arrange for pastoral service during the sickness or absence of the pastor.
- To emphasize partnership with the synod and churchwide organization of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as well as cooperation with other congregations, both Lutheran and non-Lutheran, subject to established policies of the synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- To recommend and encourage the use of program resources produced or approved by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- To seek out and encourage qualified persons to prepare for the ministry of the Gospel.
