

"In Him We Have Redemption Through His Blood, the Forgiveness of Our Trespasses" by Peter J. Weller The text for this month's lesson comes from the first chapter of Paul's letter to the Ephesians: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, as a plan for the fulness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. In him, you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption of God's own people, to the praise of his glory." (Ephesians 1:3-14)

The above is, indeed, a lengthy paragraph. In the original Greek text, it is a single sentence! Susan Hylen, Associate Professor of New Testament, Emory University, Atlanta, Georgia, wrote in Working Preacher, "Ephesians is a letter about living together in the midst of human differences. The author writes as a Jew to a largely Gentile audience with the message that in Christ God has 'made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us' (Ephesians 2:14).

"God is praised. . . for having chosen and adopted the church as God's own people. Verse 4 states that 'God chose us' to be holy and blameless, and verse 5 adds, 'he destined us for adoption as his children.'

"Adoption was not uncommon in antiquity. Among the elite it served the important function of allowing for an heir if one had no children, or if one's children died. The adopted person . . . gained social status through association with the parent's social status. In the same way a biological child would, the adopted child benefitted from the social and political connections of their parent. They also gained wealth through their inheritance. In return the adopted child honored the parent through taking the parent's name and being loyal to them. Continued to page 5



Raising Our Voice for Iowa Children and Families: Families struggling without access to mental healthcare. Human services providers overworked and underpaid. Former refugees and immigrants striving to build new lives. These are all issues faced by Iowans. Help us ensure their voices are heard at the Iowa State Capitol. Compassion During Crisis

Across the state, LSI team members work with families at risk of child abuse or neglect, connecting them to the tools and resources they need to keep their children in their homes whenever safely possible. One of the critical programs available to parents is the Strengthening Families program. The program typically provides 14 weeks of in-person parent group work, family activities, and a family meal to enhance child development, help parents create their own support network, and reduce the likelihood of child abuse or neglect. When COVID-19 created challenges to this in-person model, LSI did not give up on the families who relied on this important service. Instead, LSI's Behavioral Health Intervention Services team has gone virtual. Maria, a program supervisor with LSI, has been leading a virtual version of the program this year, where families join a Zoom meeting and use "breakout rooms" for individual sessions. Meals are purchased from Hy-Vee and delivered the night of the session, so families are still able to celebrate their tradition of eating together each week. This year has created several challenges for all of us, but LSI continues to answer the call and provide the high-quality care and services Iowa children and families deserve.

"The adoption indicated here is unique in that it is not the adoption of an individual but of a people. The language echoes the stories of God choosing Israel . . . and the purpose of being chosen for 'redemption' (Ephesians 1:7, 14) evokes God's release of Israel from slavery (e.g., Exodus 6:6). . . . The author is not so much concerned with God's relationship to individual believers as with the claim that God has chosen a people for God's self."

Karoline Lewis, Professor and the Marbury E. Anderson Chair of Biblical Preaching at Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minnesota, also wrote in the Working Preacher, ". . . it is worthwhile to remember that at stake in all of this is God's longing to bring the entire world into the relationship that is acknowledged at the start of the blessing– 'Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ' (1:3). Just as God is Father to Jesus, God desires to be father to all who are in Christ. In fact, in verse 3, the root for 'blessing' is used no less than three times in this one verse. This repetition of blessing sets the stage for the claim of the abundance of God's grace that is at the heart of these opening verses of the letter.

"These verses . . . [from] Ephesians are always the designated epistle reading for the Second Sunday of Christmas, paired with the Prologue of the Gospel of John (1:1-18), in all three years of the Revised Common Lectionary. One obvious reason for this matchmaking lies in the language about adoption and inheritance found in the Ephesians text as compared to John's similar claim, 'But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God" (1:12-13).' "

In these verses (Ephesians 1:3-14), we see, clearly, that God takes the initiative and acts. God comes into the lives of believers. God chose us. God blessed us. God adopted us as God's children. God redeemed us through Christ. God freely bestowed God's grace upon us. In Christ, we have received an inheritance. Believing in him marks us with the seal of the Holy Spirit. God initiates the action, lavishing us with all these good gifts. This is all God's work. These are God's gifts to us. Nothing that we do on our own can bring about this same result.

The Epiphany Season

January brings us out of the Christmas season and into the season of Epiphany. "Epiphany" means "to show" or "to make known" or "to reveal". During the 2nd century "Epiphany" was used, by the church, to express the manifestations of the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ. During the Epiphany Season, manifestations of God incarnate are commemorated: **Jesus, Lord and King, of both Jews and Gentiles** – when the Wise Men visited child Jesus in Bethlehem. The Wise Men were the first to reveal Jesus, to the world, as the incarnate Christ. This is called the Epiphany of Our Lord and is always celebrated on January 6th. The color of the paraments for Epiphany is white: purity, holiness, and joy. **Jesus' Divinity** – Jesus' baptism by John the Baptist, with the speaking of God the Father and the appearance of God the Holy Spirit revealed Jesus to be God's Son (celebrated Sunday, January 10th). The color of the paraments is also white. **Jesus revealing God's power through love for the world** – made known through Jesus' ministry of preaching, miracles, and healings. The color of the paraments is green: representing the new life that Jesus gives us and our spiritual growth.

The Epiphany season concludes with the Transfiguration of our Lord, which will be celebrated on Sunday, February 14th. The church year moves from the season of Epiphany into the season of Lent beginning, Ash Wednesday, February 17th.

Gary Fischer and Pastor Howard will be the two lead participants. We will need to formulate a small group of people (don't know how many) to join in this process. THEN we will need the entire congregation's participation as we get involved. This means not being afraid to experiment (even if they don't go as we expected) and become innovative. Yes, change will be inevitable. The fruits that we will be able to harvest from this learning community and the changes we will implement will be a blessing to the financial sustainability of Immanuel.

Second Sunday of Christmas; January 3rd

The feast of Epiphany ("manifestation") concludes the Christmas season with a celebration of God's glory revealed in the person of Jesus Christ. In Isaiah and Ephesians, that glory is proclaimed for all nations and people. Like the light of the star that guided the magi to Jesus, the light of Christ reveals who we are: children of God who are claimed and washed in the waters of baptism. We are sent out to be beacons of the light of Christ, sharing the good news of God's love to all people.





Baptism of Our Lord; January 10th

Our re-creation in baptism is an image of the Genesis creation, where the Spirit of God moved over the waters. Both Mark's gospel and the story in Acts make clear that it is the Spirit's movement that distinguishes Jesus' baptism from John's. The Spirit has come upon us as upon Jesus and the Ephesians, calling us God's beloved children and setting us on Jesus' mission to re-create the world in the image of God's vision of justice and peace.
