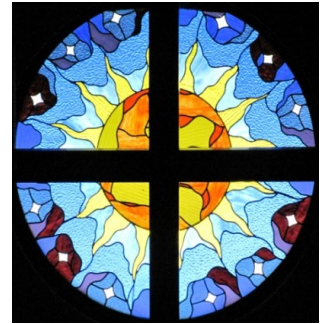

"Have You Not Known? Have You Not Heard?"

The text for this month's lesson comes from the book of Isaiah, Chapter 40: "Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth? It is he who sits above the circle of the earth, and its inhabitants are like grasshoppers; who stretches out the heavens like a curtain, and spreads them like a tent to live in; who brings princes to naught and makes the rulers of the earth as nothing.

"Scarcely are they planted, scarcely sown, scarcely has their stem taken root in the earth, when he blows upon them, and they wither, and the tempest carries them off like stubble.

"To whom then will you compare me, or who is my equal? says the Holy One. Lift up your eyes on high and see: Who created these? He who brings out their host and numbers them, calling them all by name; because he is great in strength, mighty in power, not one is missing.

"Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the LORD, and my right is disregarded by my God'? Have you not known? Have you not heard? The LORD is the everlasting God, and creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. Even youths will faint and be weary, and the young will fall exhausted, but those who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." (Isaiah 40: 21-31)

These words from the second Isaiah are addressed to those Israelites who returned from the Babylonian exile, somewhere around 530 BCE. No doubt, they discovered a destroyed Jerusalem and the temple in ruins. Having been away from their homeland for fifty years, only their older members would have remembered what Jerusalem and life there was like before they were exiled. The younger ones, born in exile, had no such knowledge. So, how then does this remnant of a former society, these returnees, pick up the pieces and rebuild from the ruins? How many might have felt either that their God had abandoned them, or that they really did not know who their God was? How do they relate to the current inhabitants of Jerusalem who had not left or had moved there after the exile? How easy is it to start over and attempt to build back what once was?

Building a Bond- Julie had made a promise years ago: If anything happened to her friend, Julie would take care of her son, Jacob. When Jacob's mom passed away and he had no place to go, Julie stepped up. Her six children had grown up and moved out of her home, and she had the resources and space needed to care for Jacob. She became a mentor through LSI's Host Homes program. The service enables Iowans with disabilities to move into a private family home and live with a specially-selected mentor instead of living in a shared space with roommates and several staff members. Jacob moved into Julie's home last December and now, the two are thriving. Jacob is learning to take care of himself and build the life skills he needs to feel more confident and independent. He is learning to cook and enjoys looking up new recipes to try, especially meatloaf.

"It's a great opportunity. You're changing their lives," Julie says. "You get to know each other more personally. We have a lot of discussions and heart-to-hearts." Jacob is finishing his senior year of high school. He enjoys learning new things and visiting new places, and he dreams of the day when he and Julie can go on more trips. Once it is safe to do so, Jacob is determined to visit more zoos and take a trip to Canada.

"It's good," Jacob says of his Host Homes match with Julie. "She makes me laugh."

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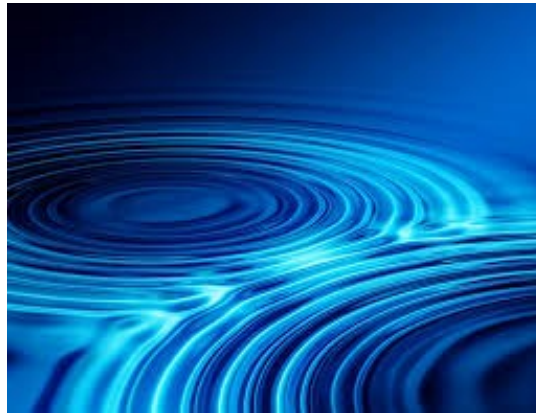
In this context, the questions asked by the prophet begin to make sense: "Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?" Second Isaiah also answers those questions: "The LORD is the everlasting God, and creator of the ends of the earth. He does not faint or grow weary; his understanding is unsearchable. He gives power to the faint, and strengthens the powerless. . . . [T]hose who wait for the LORD shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint." (Isaiah 40:27-31)

For those returning from Babylon, This was a time for new beginnings. It was also a time to recognize old truths: God is still in charge. God was with them all along. Second Isaiah challenges the people with a question, "Why do you say, O Jacob, and speak, O Israel, 'My way is hidden from the LORD, and my right is disregarded by my God'?" (Isaiah 40:27) Nothing can be hidden from the Lord. And, it is not for humans to question why God does or does not do certain things or that he chooses to exercise his power and authority in certain ways. God's understanding is unsearchable.

All that Second Isaiah writes in this chapter can apply to today. Truth is important. Truth matters. Understanding how we got to where we are today is important. Hence the prophet's questions: "Have you not known? Have you not heard? Has it not been told you from the beginning? Have you not understood from the foundations of the earth?" Sadly, we forget. We deceive ourselves and choose to believe otherwise and embrace untruths. But, sooner or later, we come back to what is true, and with God's guidance, we move forward from darkness back into the light.

### **Car Hop Communion: Sunday, February 14<sup>th</sup>**

Pastor Howard will be serving Holy Communion on **Sunday, February 14<sup>th</sup>, 10:30 a.m. – 11 a.m.** under the portico in the church's parking lot. 55 people were nourished with the presence of Christ at Car Hop Communion on Sunday, January 10<sup>th</sup>.

Pastor Howard will consecrate the elements (wafers, wine, and grape juice) during the live stream/conference call worship, 9 a.m. Pastor Howard will be wearing a face shield when consecrating the elements and a face mask during distribution. The common cup will not be available only individual, plastic cups. Cars will enter the parking lot through the North entrance and exit through the West entrance. Pastor Howard will give you Holy Communion while you remain in your cars. You will then drive to the garbage can and throw away your plastic cup(s). However, if you chose not to participate in this meal opportunity, fasting is still an appropriate option.

Communion is served under the portico in the church's parking lot, regardless of the weather.



### **Car Hop Ashes and Holy Communion**

Pastor Howard will be offering the imposition of ashes, under Immanuel's portico, with the words "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19b) TWO times on Ash Wednesday, February 17<sup>th</sup>; between Noon – 12:30 p.m. and again between 7 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. Holy Communion will be served ONLY during 7 p.m. – 7:30 p.m. Drive into the parking lot from the North and exit to the West.

Holy Communion will be given to you in a prepackaged form with the wafer sealed onto a sealed cup of grape juice. This will make Communion distribution clean and safe as imposition of ashes is also offered.

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### **8 Hours of Prayer on Ash Wednesday; February 17<sup>th</sup>**

Lent is a time for us to fast, be in prayer, and repent as we realign ourselves and renew our commitment to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Do many of us really take the time to be silent and listen for the quiet whispers of the Holy Spirit? Many times, prayer is a self-absorbed, a laundry list of our wants (with stipulations attached) that we bring to God to fulfill. We are going to begin the season of Lent with an opportunity to be in prayer. We are going to give ourselves the gift and freedom to be quiet and alone in the presence of God. On Ash Wednesday, **February 17<sup>th</sup>** someone will be in the sanctuary, in private prayer for **1 hour, beginning at 6:00 a.m.** Call the church, 653-3950, to sign up for an hour (beginning at 6:00 a.m. and concluding at 2:00 p.m.) of prayer in the sanctuary and open yourself up to the power of God; you'll be glad you did. ## Ash Wednesday is February 17<sup>th</sup>

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, the season of penance and reflection that prepares us to celebrate Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. The ashes we receive on our forehead, in the shape of a cross, are an outward sign of our sinfulness and need for repentance. They also symbolize our mortality, a reminder that one-day we will die and our bodies will return to dust. Pastor Howard quotes Genesis 3:19b, "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" to each person as they receive the ashes. With ashes upon our forehead we return to God's mercy and grace. Immanuel Lutheran's **Ash Wednesday**

**Live Streaming / Conference call worship service** will be at **4:00 p.m.** The imposition of ashes and Holy Communion will only be distributed during Car Hop options on the 17<sup>th</sup>.

**Mid-Week Lenten Worship; 7 p.m.**

Pastor Howard will be offering Night Prayer (Compline) worship on Wednesday evenings during Lent. Compline is the final church service appointed for the evening bringing the day to a quiet close. This service will be contemplative as Compline is simple, with meditative silence, penitential prayers, and concludes with our rest and peace in God. Worship will only be **live streamed** to Immanuel's Facebook page, Immanuel Lutheran Washington Iowa, and the **conference call option** on **W 10<sup>th</sup>, 17<sup>th</sup>, and 24<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m.** This Lent unwind, reorient, and record mid-week worship experience.



## Lent: What is it? Why is it?

The highlight of the year for Christians is Easter, the day when our Lord rose from the dead. Lent is a forty-day (not counting six Sundays in Lent) season of preparation for Easter. It always begins on a Wednesday, Ash Wednesday, six and one-half weeks before Easter. It ends on Holy Saturday, the last day of Holy Week, which immediately precedes Easter Sunday.

“Lent” is an Old English word for spring, the season when the days lengthen. Why 40 days? We remember the 40 days in the ark surrounded by water, the 40 years the Israelites wandered in the wilderness, and the 40 days Jesus fasted and was tempted in the wilderness, and the 40 days of Lent when we fast, pray, demonstrate acts of love, and look for our spiritual rebirth. Lent is not required anywhere in scripture, but has been observed for the last two thousand years.

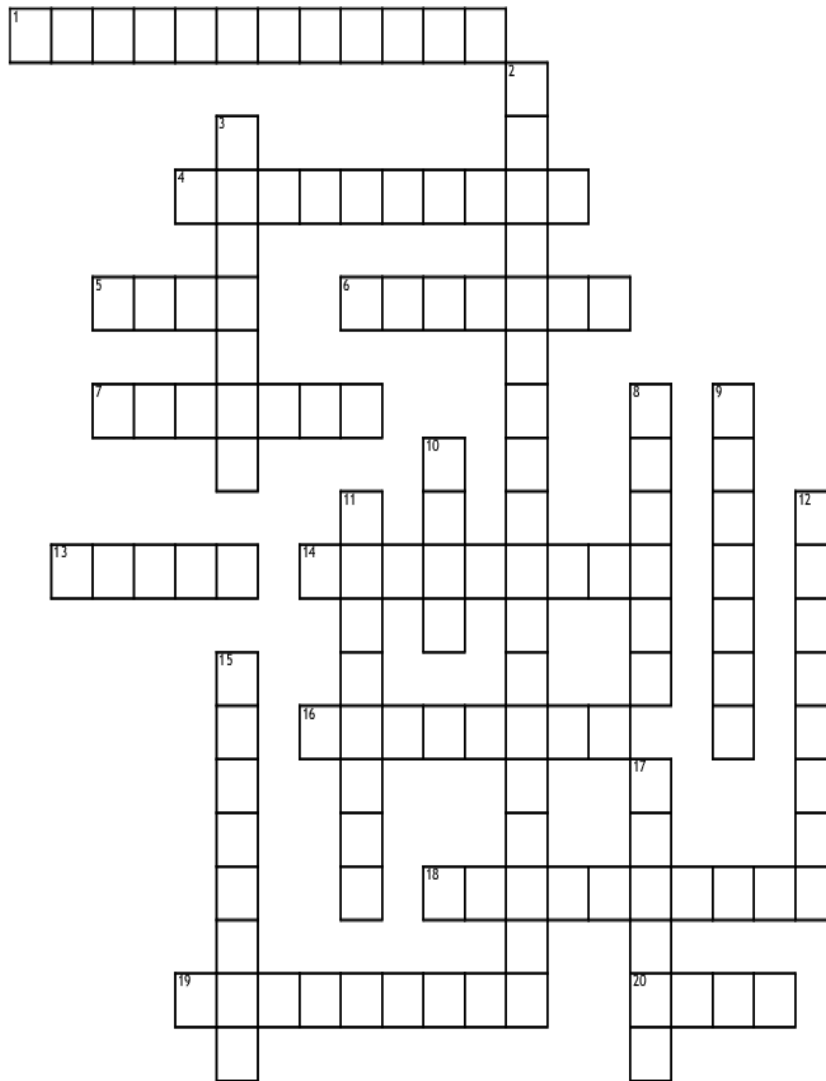
The color used in the sanctuary is purple, a color which symbolized both the pain and suffering leading up to the crucifixion of Jesus as well as the suffering of humanity and the world under sin. Purple is also the color of royalty and so anticipates, through the suffering and death of Jesus, the coming resurrection and hope of newness that will be celebrated in Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday. Simply put, Lent is a time to carefully examine our relationship with God and for spiritual renewal.

Pastor Howard invites you to a discipline of making the sign of the cross upon your forehead with God's baptismal water. Remind yourself that through your baptism you are a claimed, beloved child of God and an inheritor of all of God's promises through Jesus Christ.
