"And Just As Moses Lifted Up the Serpent In the Wilderness, So Must the Son of Man Be Lifted Up" by Peter J. Weller

This month's column comes from the Old Testament book of Numbers, Chapter 21. In this story, the wandering Israelites grumble to Moses because they must endure the difficult conditions of the wilderness. Many even begin longing for the familiar comforts of their lives under Egyptian slavery rather than endure the privations encountered on this Wilderness trek. Rudyard Kipling, in a different context, penned a line drawn from this story, "Why brought ye us from bondage, our loved Egyptian night?"

As recorded in Numbers 21:4-9, the story is as follows: "The people spoke against God and against Moses, 'Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there's is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food.' Then the LORD sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. The people came to Moses and said, 'We have sinned by speaking against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD to take away the serpents from us.' So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, 'Make a poisonous serpent and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live.' So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.' "

We do not know the size and length of the pole or the size of the bronze snake. But these had to have been of significant size so that they could be seen easily from anywhere within the encampment. Otherwise, how would one have known where to look? Once bitten, getting oneself to a position where one could see the pole could be painfully difficult, if not impossible. And, if one were bitten at some distance from the campsite, how then might they be able to see the bronze snake? Another question: How long did it take to construct this pole and bronze serpent, and how many Israelites died from snakebites before it was completed? No answers are given to questions like these, however.

A more important part of the story, however, is the impatience and ingratitude of the Israelites regarding God's leadership and God's gifts to them. God, through Moses led them out of Egypt, from slavery to freedom. God provided them food and water when there was none. God gave them the laws for an organized and orderly society.

IMMANUEL to OPEN IN PERSON WORSHIP Beginning Sunday, MARCH 7th!!!

Council has determined that with the COVID cases dropping in the county and people receiving the vaccine on the rise, it is time to reopen Immanuel's sanctuary for in person worship.

Worship will REMAIN at 9 a.m.

Beginning March 7th, you will have three opportunities to worship our Triune God as Immanuel Lutheran: in person; live streamed to Immanuel's Facebook page (Immanuel Lutheran Washington Iowa), website (luthwash.org), and YouTube (luthwash); and conference call (319) 656-2663 using participant code 344238#. This phone line will open at 8:50 a.m. on Sundays and it will end at the conclusion of worship.

To worship together safely, Immanuel's Council has approved guidelines we will be following. **Please note that in person worship is through reservation only.**

Immanuel's Guidelines for Safe, Sanctuary Worship

BEGINS SUNDAY, MARCH 7TH, 9 a.m.



In person, sanctuary worship is by reservation only.



Reservations are to be made by calling Immanuel, 653-3950, by the Wednesday prior to Sunday. Reservations will be taken on a first come first served basis. Kelly will connect with you regarding your Sunday reservation.



If the sanctuary meets its maximum capacity prior to your reservation, you will be on the wait list for the following Sunday.



It is requested that cancelations are made no later than Saturday morning.



All doors will be available to enter and exit the building.

Face masks must be worn inside Immanuel Lutheran Church. Masks must be worn properly, covering both the nose and mouth. Face masks will be available if you need one.



It is requested that no fellowship occurs in the hallways and that you remain at least 6 feet from one another.



It is requested that you are at worship by 8:50 a.m., to receive any instructions prior to worship going live online.

Seating in the sanctuary will be assigned, an usher will seat you and dismiss you (from the back to the front).

Once seated, it is requested that all congregants remain in their pews for the duration of the worship service.





There will be no congregational singing. Singing by the accompanist only.



Liturgical responses will be softly spoken.

When sharing Christ's peace, the practice of bowing to each other will be practiced.

Offering plates will be located at the back of the sanctuary, no passing the plate.



Holy Communion Sundays: prepacked Communion will be taken off a table in the narthex and consumed while seated in the pew.



Nursery: not staffed, but available.

Contact tracing: If someone tests positive within the week after attending worship, call the church. Pastor Howard will call the people who were in church that Sunday and tell them that an anonymous person tested positive on X date.

A Path to Hope and Healing

Mike remembers feeling angry and depressed, and his family was at risk of falling apart. When he decided to start Therapy Services with LSI, he questioned the decision. Therapy wasn't easy and when he missed an appointment, he didn't want to go back.

But through working with his LSI therapist, Sherry, for the past several months, he has found ways to grow and heal. During each session, Sherry is there to listen without judgement, and she provides a listening ear for anything Mike wants to talk about. At the end, Mike is always given a type of homework or a lesson to think about until they meet again.

While they originally began meeting in person, Sherry has continued to be available through virtual therapy throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. The virtual sessions ensure Sherry and Mike can continue meeting regularly, on a flexible schedule and from the safety of their own homes.

"Thank God for working through LSI in-person and through telehealth, and especially for Sherry, who helps people like myself who have been lost for years. If I hadn't chosen LSI, I wouldn't have met my therapist who has truly helped me keep my family and stay alive," Mike says. "I look back at the progress I have made and see some light peeking through to the end."

Yet, they complained: "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there's is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food." So much for manna from heaven. So much for appreciation of God's goodness and his love for his chosen people. What we have here is a lack of faith in God's laws and leadership, a rejection of the food that God has provided, as well as God's generosity, coupled with the demand that God do more and better by the Israelites. What God thought of this display of ingratitude and rejection can be seen in the proliferation of the snake population.

Clearly, most people do not deal well with adversity. Frankly, they would prefer not be anywhere near it. They would rather avoid it than face it. It takes a special kind of mindset to run towards danger when every instinct says to run from it. Wilderness conditions can be grueling, and it becomes easy to convince oneself that the difficult and dangerous life of the past was somehow not as bad as that of the present. This is where leadership becomes critical for the survival of the group. In this case, we have both Moses' leadership and God's.

Compared to the earlier difficulties and privations of the wilderness, the snakebites were even worse. The people also saw a cause and effect relationship between their rebellion against God and the appearance of snakes, and they felt remorse. They acknowledged their sin and asked Moses to pray to the Lord for relief from the snakes.

In his encounter with Nicodemus, Jesus refers to the story outlined above and tells Nicodemus, "And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that whoever believes in him may have eternal life" (John 3:14-15)

In both instances, what is required is that one believe (that looking at the snake on the pole saves one's life; or that Jesus is the Savior who brings eternal life). This is the promise, and the gift. And, even though we continually seek them, there are no easy paths through life here on earth. There will be times when it will be difficult and uncomfortable and messy and possibly even scary. Yet, God is always faithful, even if we are not. God loves us, even if we are not always lovable. If we look to God, and have faith and believe in God, then we will have life eternal.

Greetings from the Renew-Refresh & Rejoice group!

This has been a trying time for so many of us from worship services, social gatherings, shopping and so much more, but we have been busy within the walls of the church. The pledges that came forward for matching funds from the Washington County Riverboat Foundation (WCRF) grant were put in a reserved account for the items we presented to you. With COVID-19, the WCRF put grant monies on hold as many businesses (profit and non-profit) had to close or reduce their hours of business due to mandates set by the State of Iowa by recommendations of the Centers of Disease Control (CDC). There was commitment to vendors that we wanted to start right away and with everything on hold with grant applications and funds the decision was to begin on the priority list with number one and see how things went.

Upon returning to worship, you will notice the sound system has been updated and it will speak for itself when listening to worship services or other events. The update included sound in the nursery, narthex, hallway and fellowship hall. The lighting has been updated. If you have driven by the church in the evening, you will see that the windows of the sanctuary are illuminated (and project a wonderful scene on the snow). New projectors and screens were installed in the chancel area with a lighting change so enable a full view of the screens. COVID-19 brought live streaming brought us something new to learn and view. Seeing that it wasn't going to be short term, decision was to spend funds from the Renew-Refresh & Rejoice a camera instead of using Pastor's cell phone and laptops (purchased from General Funds) to operate the camera (14 positions from one location) in the sanctuary. Mike Jewell and Lucas Kroll have worked many hours on tweaking the positions and video quality to bring the live streaming to be the best we possibly provide.

The funds raised through this fundraiser will be deposited into the reserved account for Renew-Refresh & Rejoice project to bolster the monies for a future application to the WCRF for items that remain on the list and the future.

Updates on The Forward Funding Community

long journey since January. During this year-long course Immanuel will:



- Gain a clearer understanding of Immanuel's current financial model and renewed sense of our mission in Washington.
- Listen to community members, discern where the Spirit is leading, and determine what creative and conventional funding sources might be required to follow the Spirit's lead.
- Engage in funding experiments that allow Immanuel to deeply engage Washington, live out God's mission, and create more financial sustainability.

We are one of ten church chosen across the United States and all denominations! One church has since dropped out. The pastor and lay leader of each church have met four times via Zoom; twice with all nine churches and twice in our accountability group of three churches (Immanuel's group meeting on Thursday, Feb 25th). Immanuel Lutheran's accountability group comprises Church of the Savior - Lutheran in Paramus, NJ and Atonement Lutheran Church in Muskego, WI. Each month, throughout the year, Gary and Pastor Howard will meet with the large group (two hours) and with the accountability group (one hour) via Zoom.

Each participant has been given the book THE COMING REVOLUTION IN CHURCH ECONOMICS Why Tithes and Offerings Are No Longer Enough, and What You Can do About It by Mark Deymaz with Harry Li to read. We have watched two Ted Talks, the first by Ernesto Sirolli titled "Want to help someone? Shut up and listen!" and the second talk by Navi Radjou titled "Creative problem-solving in the face of extreme limits". We have engaged in active listening and playing a game called "Mission Possible" (engaging in steps to address a particular problem in a community). Our March homework is for Gary and Pastor Howard to each complete a "Money & Privilege" autobiography.

Immanuel is in the process of putting together a Learning Community Guiding Team from members of our congregation. The team will consist of four – six people who want to assist in moving Immanuel Lutheran into an innovative, financial sustainable future as we engage in God's mission. Our Forward Funding leaders suggest that the team be comprised of people with one of these gifts: listener, creative entrepreneur, astute businessperson, project manager, and creative thinker. Part of a letter sent from former Pastor Caltvedt: You probably wondered why you didn't hear from me at Christmas 2020. The short answer is that I suffered a stroke in early November and did not get home from therapy until Dec. 12. I still use a walker and I must type this letter with one finger. The stroke affected my left side. My balance is not good......I still continue my work with compost producing 2 tons each year from the over 100 gardens on our property......God has not abandoned us, but we sure can do a better job caring for God's creation......I need your prayers for healing.
