

"The Holy Spirit Fell Upon All Who Heard the Word."
by Peter J. Weller

All of the First Lesson readings for this month are from the Book of Acts. In this book, we see the growth and expansion of Christianity, beginning as a sect of Judaism, and then becoming a major world religion in its own right. The Apostle, Peter, was particularly active in expanding Christianity in the Eastern Mediterranean regions north of Jerusalem, and he has been believed to have founded the Church of Antioch and served as bishop there for seven years. Some ancient writings have said that he also traveled to Corinth and to Rome and that, he and Paul together founded Churches there.

Unquestionably, Paul was indeed the greatest missionary of the early Church. More than any other person, he caused this new religion to grow, and he established congregations throughout the regions of Turkey and Greece, as well as in Rome. Nine of his thirteen letters in the New Testament were addressed to congregations that he helped to organize.

In the tenth chapter of Acts, Peter addressed a gathering of family members and friends at the home of a Roman centurion, Cornelius, a devout believer who feared God. That a Roman military officer could become a follower of Jesus says something about the power and growth of this new religion: that this God of the Jews is not just the God of the Jews only, but is God of the world, that others, non-Jews, can receive the Holy Spirit, can believe in Jesus, and gain eternal life.

Chapter 10 of Acts tells us that an angel, in a vision, appeared to Cornelius and told him to send for Peter, who at the time was in Joppa, and tell him to come to Cornelius' house in Caesarea so that he and those close to him can hear what Peter had to say. Similarly, the Spirit spoke to Peter and told him to go to Cornelius. After his arrival, Peter began to speak to them, and he gave a quick synopsis of Jesus' ministry on earth, that he went about doing good, that he was anointed with the Holy Spirit, that he was crucified, that God raised him from the dead, and that those who believe in him receive forgiveness of sins through his name.

"While Peter was still speaking, the Holy Spirit fell upon all who heard the word. The circumcised believers who had come with Peter were astounded that the gift of the Holy Spirit had been poured out even on the Gentiles, for they heard them speaking in tongues and extolling God. Then Peter said, 'Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have?' So he ordered them to be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ. Then they invited him to stay for several days." (Acts 10:44-48)

Wrapping Care Around Iowa Children

Martha and Marti first became foster parents in September of 2018, after their biological children expressed that they wanted to provide foster care as a family. They decided to become licensed through LSI Foster Care and Adoption and soon after, they welcomed a sibling group of three into their home. "Our kids really wanted to look into foster care as a way to be able to help others as a family," Martha says. "Everybody had to sacrifice and pour in, and everybody was needed and brought something to the table." The siblings stayed with the family for almost two years, until the opportunity came for them to find a forever home through adoption. Over the years, the siblings had become bonded to Martha and Marti, as well as their extended family and friends. The siblings are currently in the process of officially being adopted by a family close to Martha and Marti, so they can continue to stay connected to the important relationships they built in foster care. The family has found a passion they can all share, and it's making a difference in the lives of Iowa children. "We always explain fostering as 'good' and 'hard.' You never want to take one away from the other, because it's both. It's the hardest thing we've ever done, but it's the best thing we've done," Martha says. "We've had the privilege of having the kids in our home and you have the responsibility and the privilege to take care of them in their time of need."

Peter faced criticism in Jerusalem for associating with, preaching to, and baptizing Gentiles in Caesarea. But, Peter defended himself by telling them about all that had happened in Caesarea, and he said, "If then God gave [the Gentiles] the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God?" The scripture continues, "When they heard this, they were silenced. And they praised God saying, 'Then God has given even to the Gentiles the repentance that leads to life.' " Acts 11:1-18)

We see here the beginnings of the realization among Jesus' followers that Jesus Christ and his teachings and his place and importance in the world were meant to be more than just for the Jewish people, they were meant for the whole world. Very probably, Peter thought of what Jesus had said to his disciples after the resurrection, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age." (Matthew 28:19-20) But, Peter also sensed, from his visit with Cornelius, that there was a hunger among at least some of the Gentiles to learn about and to know and believe in Jesus, and that the Holy Spirit was actively engaged in making that happen. Perhaps, there were even more Gentiles that could be reached and would embrace the word of God and accept Jesus as God's Son and gain eternal life.

What is amazing to contemplate is the vast growth in numbers of the followers of Jesus Christ over the centuries, from twelve disciples to more than two billion believers today. For the most part, and especially in the beginning, this growth occurred simply by world of mouth, one on one, or in small groups, without the use of the printed word, without radio, television, or other forms of mass communication, and often in the face of powerful opposition by governments or significant social or religious forces. Yet, through the power of the Holy Spirit—as it was on the Day of Pentecost, as it was with Cornelius and his family and friends, and as it is today and will be in the future—that people come to know and accept Christ. As Martin Luther wrote in his Small Catechism, "I believe that by my own understanding or strength I cannot believe in Jesus Christ my Lord or come to him, but instead the Holy Spirit has called me through the gospel, enlightened me with his gifts, made me holy and kept me in the true faith. . . ." Indeed.



Ascension of Our Lord; Thursday, May 13th

We often cast our eyes upward to look for God. When we are feeling lonely or misunderstood, we raise our hands to ask why, or shake our fists in gestures of prayer, anguish, or praise. While the scriptures promise that God is king of all the earth, sitting on his holy throne (Psalm 47), we need not only look up for God's action in our lives. Our ascended Lord lives in the heavens, but Jesus does not leave his disciples—or us—to fumble while he naps in the clouds. Before he ascends, Jesus promises that we are clothed with the Holy Spirit's power, witnesses "to the ends of the earth" (Acts 1:8). We look up to the skies for help, then return our gaze to those among us in need of our care, to the body of Christ and the wind of the Spirit among the baptized, preparing for the time when Jesus comes again to gather us in. WEAR RED Pentecost ~ Sunday, May 23rd

Pentecost is an especially important day in the church year. The name "Pentecost" comes from a Greek word meaning "fifty." It is fifty days after Easter and commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit on the early Christians. It is the birthday of the church! The color of the day is red, to remind us of the flames of fire that rested on each of them as they gathered together; "They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit" (Acts 2:3-4a). We thank God for giving us His Holy Spirit at our Baptism. "The Holy Spirit calls us through the Gospel, enlightens us with God's gifts, and sanctifies us and keeps us in true faith. In the same way the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it untied with Jesus Christ in the one true faith" (The Small Catechism by Martin Luther; the Third Article of the Apostles' Creed). Let us celebrate the birth of the church through the Holy Spirit at Pentecost by wearing red!

Holy Trinity Sunday; May 30th

The doctrine of the Trinity invites us to consider how a God constituted by relationship—the Father with the Son, the Son with the Spirit, the Spirit with the Father—draws us into that relationship with God and one another. Gradually or suddenly, through the work of the Spirit, we come to know our belonging to the Father and to Christ's body.

In such loving relationships, truth is discovered. But people cannot bear the truth all at once, so discipleship and faith formation are gradual processes of listening for the Spirit's voice. Christian practices such as worship, learning, and service are occasions for people of all ages to be "guided into truth." Such practices are rooted in baptism, in which God draws us into a lifelong relationship in which we grow into truth and love over time—guided by the Spirit, accompanied by Jesus, and having peace with the Father.

In Romans, we hear the truth of how love originates and grows in us: Poured into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, God's love gives us a hope that will never disappoint. Christian community offers the delightful opportunity to experience one's own growth in hope, faith, and love, and to witness others' growth as they too are drawn more deeply into relationship with the triune God. Pastor Howard will consecrate the elements (wafers, wine, and grape juice) during worship, 9 a.m. Pastor Howard will be wearing a face mask when consecrating the elements and during distribution. The common cup will not be available only individual, plastic cups. Cars will enter the parking lot through the North entrance and exit through the West entrance. Pastor Howard will give you Holy Communion while you remain in your cars. You will then drive to the garbage can and throw away your plastic cup(s).
