"We Know That the One Who Raised the Lord Jesus Will Raise Us Also With Jesus" by Peter J. Weller

All of the Second Readings for June are from Paul's Second Letter to the Corinthians. This month's column will look specifically at verses 4:13–5:1. Paul writes: "But just as we have the same spirit of faith that is in accordance with scripture—'I believed, and so I spoke'—we also believe, and so we speak, because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence. Yes, everything is for your sake, so that grace, as it extends to more and more people, may increase thanksgiving, to the glory of God.

"So we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day. For this slight momentary affliction is preparing us for an eternal weight of glory beyond all measure, because we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal.

"For we know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens." (2 Corinthians 4:13–5:1)

If you read carefully the words that Paul chooses in writing this text, you can visualize and understand the depth of his faith as he proclaims the wondrous meaning of the Resurrection and its importance and implications for us. Paul writes that, in that same spirit of faith, "... we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence." (v. 14)

Paul is clearly aware of the frailty of human existence. "Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day." (2 Corinthians 4:16) A human body is not designed to live on this earth forever; therefore, any of us can, on average, expect to live, some 80 to 100 years, more or less. Yet, the human mind can comprehend the concept of eternity. As Paul writes, ". . . we look not at what can be seen but at what cannot be seen; for what can be seen is temporary, but what cannot be seen is eternal." (v. 18) In other words, what can be seen is less permanent and more illusory than we can imagine. What cannot be seen is far more durable and of greater value.

Happy Father's Day! At Lutheran Services in Iowa (LSI), we strive to build up and empower Iowa kids and families. For us, Father's Day is a time to celebrate all the fathers and male role models we see every day. Through our Early Childhood Services, young men are learning to become dads. They're becoming confident and active in their child's life, and they are creating loving, bright futures for their families.

Many Iowa children entering foster care need a positive male role model in their lives. And through LSI Foster Care and Adoption, our licensed foster dads are there to help guide them. #### **Finding Paradise**

Perseverance is a familiar quality for Mon, who after spending decades living as a refugee from an early age was recently able to place roots in Iowa and succeed in building a life for his family. After living in a Nepali refugee camp for almost 24 years, Mon's family was able to resettle in the U.S. When they arrived in Iowa, they moved directly into a tiny apartment. But the single room was not sufficient for their family – especially once their youngest daughter was born. They stayed in the apartment for four years, but Mon was determined to create a better home for his family. Mon secured housing for his family through the Habitat for Humanity program, and through LSI Refugee and Immigrant Services, he was able to get on track and save and earn money towards his goal of homeownership. With guidance from staff in LSI's Match and Save financial program, he was able to open a savings account and develop a monthly savings plan.

Mon and his family moved into their new home last year, and he said LSI and Habitat for Humanity were critical steps in helping him learn about U.S. finances and savings – lessons that will pay off during his journey as a homeowner.

"I felt very sad when I left my country," Mon says. "I felt as if I lost my paradise. But when I got the key and when I entered my house, I felt that I regained my lost paradise. So that was the happiest moment in my life and right now, I, my family, and kids are super happy to live in this new house."

Paul clearly believes, and so implies, that what cannot be seen is superior and more worthy of our pursuit than what can be seen. In two places in this text, Paul says, "We know that. . ." At the beginning, he writes, ". . . [W]e know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence." And toward the end of this text, he writes, "[W]e know that if the earthly tent we live in is destroyed, we have a building from God, a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens."

We can ask, "How can Paul be so confidant that he can say, 'We know that. . .' "? How does he "know" that? Practically all of his "knowing" stems form his dramatic encounter with the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus and his sudden conversion and acceptance of Jesus' teachings in the days immediately following that event. Undoubtedly, this encounter had shaken Paul to his core, and it subsequently and dramatically altered his beliefs and his behavior. He later wrote in his letter to the Galatians, "For I want you to know, brothers and sisters, that the gospel that was proclaimed by me is not of human origin; for I did not receive it from a human source, nor was I taught it, but I received it through a revelation of Jesus Christ." (Galatians 1:11-12) This, indeed, was divine intervention and revelation. Before his encounter with Jesus on the road to Damascus, Paul had been schooled on Jewish Law in Jerusalem. But, the breadth of his knowledge of the gospel, as he proclaimed it in his travels and teaching, greatly surpassed whatever he might have learned there.

Dr. Carla Works, Associate Professor in New Testament, Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington, D.C., wrote in Working Preacher,

"Underlying the entire message of 2 Corinthians — and indeed Paul's whole gospel — is the apostle's certitude in God's power. God made Paul a minister (3:4-6), and it is by God's mercy that Paul has survived numerous hardships (4:1). God is a God of consolation (1:3-7) and reconciliation (5:18-21).

"God has chosen mortal bodies in which to display God's power. God is in the act of transforming bodies that are so fragile and vulnerable that Paul likens them to jars of clay (4:7). According to Paul, the reason that God has chosen such fragile vessels is to make clear 'this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us' (4:7). The good news is only possible because a powerful God is at work.

"The apostle's certitude in God's power gives him strength to face any hardship. Since Paul has faith that God who raised Jesus will also raise up those who are in Jesus (4:13-14), he can say with confidence, 'We do not lose heart' (4:16)."

#### Southeastern Iowa Synod Mission Support Thank You

THANK YOU for your continued generosity in providing mission support throughout 2020 even in the midst of Covid-19 challenges and the Derecho. For the fiscal year 2020, the Southeastern Iowa Synod received mission support at the same level as the prior year and finished the year with expenses lower than expected. In February, the Southeastern Iowa Synod Council voted unanimously to distribute surplus funds to our ministry partners based on the results of the year-end audit. A total of \$164,400 has been provided for three ministries: \$54,800 to Lutheran Services in Iowa, (over and above the synod's annual appropriation of \$175,000); \$54,800 to the LSI Disaster Response Fund; and \$54,800 to the Southeastern Iowa Synod Fund for Leaders Endowment supporting seminary students from this synod. Immanuel's financial pledge to the ministries of the Southeastern Iowa Synod is \$4,000.00.

# <sup>19</sup>I want you to know all about Christ's love, although it is too wonderful to be measured. Then your lives will be filled with all that God is. Ephesians 3:19 CEV

We are bound. Bound by our sin, by the expectations of others, by poverty, by -isms that try to divide us, and by so much more. In a life that often feels as if it has young people in a suffocating grip, we want them to imagine the boundlessness of God: boundless love, boundless mercy, boundless freedom, boundless creation, boundless strength. All offered from a gracious and loving God who knows and adores them. All so abundant and endless it cannot be measured.

What are the stories of God's people, both in Scripture and modern-day, that share the awe and wonder of just how vast our God is? What does it mean, what does it look and feel like to live a life "filled with all that God is"? How can young people find themselves within the boundlessness of Christ's love? The Gathering are unique opportunities to invite young people into a deeper relationship with a God whose possibilities are boundless. Through one-of-a-kind experiences, this ministry stretches and affirms young people's gifts and calls. They experience the power of the Spirit within them, that frees them to live in the grace of God's boundless love in Jesus Christ.

Finally, we are excited by the connections this theme offers to our host city of Minneapolis and the surrounding area. Known as the "City by Nature," Minneapolis is an earth-minded city in many ways. The Minneapolis Area Synod also names advocacy around care for creation as a top priority, which would allow us to learn from and support the local expression of the church.

Pastor Howard will be holding an interest meeting on Sunday, June 27<sup>th</sup> at 10 a.m. Youth who are in 8th to 12th grades, at the time of registration (Fall 2021), are eligible to attend the Gathering. Interested youth and their parents are invited to attend this meeting. Early Bird Registration — \$350 September 22<sup>nd</sup> – November 21<sup>st</sup>; Regular Registration — \$390 November 22<sup>nd</sup> – February 21, 2022.

## **CHANGES TO SUNDAY WORSHIP**

#### +NO RESERVATIONS NEEDED for worship attendance.

+ Face masks must be worn inside Immanuel Lutheran Church. Masks must be worn properly, covering both the nose and mouth. However, the accompanist (if chooses), Mike and Pastor Howard will not be wearing a mask when leading worship. Mike and Pastor Howard will remain in the Chancel.

+You will seat yourself continuing to practice social distancing. Ushers will continue to dismiss you at the conclusion of worship.

+Bulletins will be printed and available to you. Bulletins will be reused week to week and the weekly announcement page will be reinstated.

+The accompanist will continue to sing the appointed verse(s) of the Gathering Hymn and the liturgical music. However, the congregation will sing the Sending Hymn.

+We will use the Evangelical Lutheran Worship Books (ELWs) for the hymns.

+We will continue the practice of bowing to one another (a sign of respect as we acknowledge Christ in each of us) as a sharing of Christ's peace. The offering plates will also remain on the stands in the back of the sanctuary. For the time being, we will continue to use the individual, prepackaged Communion wafer/ cup.

## 2021 SE Iowa Synod Assembly Report

We were thankful for the opportunity to be Immanuel's delegates to the Southeastern Iowa Synod Assembly on May 22, via Zoom. The theme was Baptized And Set Free, stressing that baptism sets us free to be disciples of Christ and go tell the world about God's love.

The keynote speaker was Rev. Carmelo Santos from Arlington, VA. He is a Pastor, Social Activist and Director of Theological Diversity with the ELCA. He challenged his listeners to really "hear" the voices of others in our communities and in the world from the perspective of the Cross by putting ourselves in their shoes. He highlighted the need to combat White Supremacy, to recognize Indigenous people in our state and world, to stop Asian hate, to have compassion for migrants and refugees, to bring racial justice to the country and the world. "What is God asking us to do?

Other matters at the Assembly included (1) passing the 2022 budget (giving to the SE Iowa Synod in 2020 met and exceeded the budget) (2) election of committee members and synod council members (3) minor wording changes to the Constitution (4) passed compensation proposal for pastors and supply pastors. Our new Bishop, Amy Current, spoke of the "Church Together" to accomplish God's work. Our synod responded to many needs in 2020/2021 – Covid response fund served 387,000 people, Free Indeed Prison Ministry, Disaster Relief, World Hunger in 59 countries (\$ 31 million). The SE Iowa Synod gives over \$ 1 million to mission ministry of our larger church of the ELCA.

We passed 2 important resolutions that highlight the churches commitment to helping refugee children find homes in Iowa and recognize child abuse and develop child protective policies.
