

"The LORD, Your God, Is In Your Midst" by Peter J. Weller

The Old Testiment lesson for the third Sunday in Advent comes from the book of Zephaniah at the end of the third chapter: "Sing aloud, O daughter Zion; shout O Israel! Rejoice and exult with all your heart, O daughter Jerusalem! The LORD has taken away the judgement against you, he has turned away your enemies.

"The King of Israel, the LORD, is in your midst; you shall fear disaster no more. On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem: Do not fear, O Zion; do not let your hands grow weak. The LORD, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory; he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love; he will exult over you with loud singing as on a day of festival.

"I will remove disaster from you; so that you will not bear reproach for it. I will deal with all your oppressors at that time. And I will save the lame and gather the outcast, and I will change their shame into praise and renown in all the earth. At that time I will bring you home, at the time when I gather you; for I will make you renowned and praised among all the peoples of the earth, when I restore your fortunes before your eyes, says the LORD." (Zephaniah 3:14-20)

Zephaniah prophesied early in the 7th century BCE, about 50 years after Isaiah and before Jeremiah during the reign of King Josiah (640-609 BCE), before the Babylonian exile. Dr. Melinda Quivik, Liturgical and Homiletical Scholar from St. Paul, Minnesota, wrote in Working Preacher, "The rulers previous to Zephaniah's time had generated unjust social and political policies, leaving Judah in great need of a prophet who would call the people to make changes." Dr. Quivik continues, "Zephaniah blares out judgment against worship of false gods, rulers who act like foreigners, violence, fraud, complacency, and the faithless assumption that [God] is powerless. Image after image builds up a portrait of the destruction that will come on the Day of the Lord: 'the people. . . shall walk like the blind. . . their blood shall be poured out like dust. . . the whole earth shall be consumed. . . . '" (1:17-18).

"The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." — John 1:5

As Christmas approaches, we give thanks to you! This year has been another difficult time for all of us, and we are grateful for the Iowans who have stepped up just for the sake of giving and helping the people LSI is privileged to serve. We know parents who feel hopeless, with little resources to raise their young children. We know adults with disabilities who feel voiceless, with no support system or connection to their community. Two years ago, Kayla knew it was time for a change in her life. She had struggled with substance use for years. When she was pregnant with her youngest son, Rafe, she was determined to build a brighter future for him. She entered treatment to become sober and create a healthy home

for her baby. While in treatment, Kayla enrolled in the HOPES program through LSI Early Childhood Services, which provides in-home parenting education and guidance for parents of young children. Kellie, Kayla's LSI worker, met with her every week to ensure she had all the resources and support she needed to raise Rafe in her home. They kept track of all his important developmental milestones, sharing smiles and laughs along the way. Whether it was supplying diapers or being a listening ear, Kellie was always there for Kayla. Kayla is now two years sober, has a job as a chef, and feels empowered and confident that she has everything she needs to help her family thrive. "I just feel overwhelmed and overjoyed. I never thought I could do all this, so I'm proud of myself," she says. "There are people at LSI that care about you. They are there to support you and they are

willing to help."

And yet, at the end of the last chapter, Zephaniah concludes with the verses cited above. These verses might have been written at the end of the Babylonian exile. No more talk of God's wrath and punishment and destruction. Instead, the people are encouraged to sing and shout and praise, and God, himself, will also join in the singing and sing loudly as at a festival. What would it sound like to hear God singing? Surely, it must be magnificent and majestic. In these verses, God, in a great burst of love and magnanimity and forgiveness, promises to the people of Israel that he has taken away the judgement against them, that he is with them and among them, that he will protect them and gather them and heal them and restore their fortunes. In these verses, God announces, "The LORD, your God, is in your midst." He is saying, "I am right here with you, right now." Kathryn M. Schifferdecker, Professor of Old Testament at Luther Seminary, Saint Paul, Minnesota wrote in Working Preacher, "Such joy [by God] is not subdued; it is not quiet or dignified. The Hebrew words used in verse 17 are used elsewhere in the Bible to describe great jubilation. The LORD rejoices over his beloved, over Judah and Jerusalem, as a bridegroom rejoices over his bride (Isaiah 62:5). As David danced in front of the Ark of the Covenant, in exultation, so God rejoices over God's people (2 Samuel 6). As the morning stars sang at the creation of the world, so God sings with elation over God's beloved (Job 38:7). "We are accustomed to images of God as judge. (Indeed, much of Zephaniah uses such imagery.) We are accustomed to images of God as shepherd, gathering the flock into the fold. But how often do we imagine God as one who rejoices? One who sings? Yet here, in our text, God and God's people alike are caught up in a joy that overflows into song, a joy that springs from love renewed, relationship restored. This joy is not one-sided. It is not simply God's people who rejoice because God has forgiven and restored them. That is an altogether understandable reaction to God's redemption. It is not simply God's people who rejoice. God, too, sings and shouts with joy over this love restored. The divine heart overflows with jubilation!" In the words of Zephaniah, we see a side of God not often portrayed in the Bible, a jubilant and rejoicing and singing God, overflowing in love for his people. These are very fitting verses for the Advent season, and they remind us of how much God loves us, and why he sent his son into the world to save us, and why the seasons of Advent and Christmas are so important.

The Meaning of Christmas

In our commercialized society, during November and December, we are bombarded with jolly Santas, reindeer, happy snowpeople, and buy, buy, buy. Yet, there are hints and whispers that "Jesus is the reason for the season." Yes, Christmas celebrates the birth of Jesus. But exactly why is that fact so significant? For an answer, we need to look at the accounts of the birth of Jesus as recorded by Matthew and Luke. At the heart of these nativity narratives is a simple fact: amid the struggle of a people, who had longed for God to act in the world in new ways, God came to be with them in a way that totally identifies Himself with us as human beings. Amid the most unlikely of circumstances, to the most unlikely of people, God became a human being for the salvation of all people. Christmas is about possibility. It is not the kind of possibility that comes from a confidence in our own abilities. It is possibility that comes solely from the fact that God is God. Our God comes into our own human existence to reveal Himself and call us to Himself. Jesus is Immanuel – God with us. This fact brings the possibility of change for the world and all humanity who accept Jesus as their Savior. God has promised to be with the church and with us, His chosen people, as we live as His people in the world. It is this God, this possibility, which we celebrate at Christmas.

Chrismons

The sanctuary Christmas trees are decorated with fragile, handmade, stained glass Chrismons. A Chrismon is one of several Christian symbols representing our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ (his life, ministry, Divinity) and the church year. The term "Chrismon" comes from the Latin phrase "Christi Monogramma," meaning "monogram of Christ."

The monogram of Christ ~ the Greek letter X ("chi") superimposed upon the Greek letter P ("rho") Other Chrismons are:

Alpha and Omega ~ God is the beginning and end

Shield ~ Jesus is our defender

Bible ~ Holy Scripture is God's living Word

Star of David ~ Jesus is the descendant of David

Bethlehem Star ~ Jesus is the Savior of the world

Descending Dove ~ Holy Spirit

Fish ~ Jesus Christ is the Son of God; Greek $i\chi\theta\dot{\nu}\zeta$ ichthus, meaning "fish": Jesus (I), Christ (X), God (θ),

Son (Ú), Savior (C)

Candle ~ Jesus is the light of the world

Lamp ~ Jesus is the lamp of God's light

Anchor ~ Jesus is our hope

Butterfly ~ Through Jesus we have everlasting life

Crown ~ Jesus is the King of Kings

Bread and Chalice ~ Body and Blood of Jesus

Crosses ~ Power of God

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Mike and I have been living apart for the past two years. Mike has a job in Ames with the National Veterinary Services Laboratory which he loves. He commutes between Ames and Washington on the weekends. Though we have made this work, Mike and I long to live together.

The financial grounding of Immanuel Lutheran Church is thinning. On several occasions at Annual Meetings, it's been stated I make too much money. The past couple of years, I have accepted an extra week of vacation in lieu of a raise. To save money in 2022, Council has approved the removal of Mike and Mariah from my health insurance (giving a coverage stipend instead). As Jesus says in Matthew (6:21) and Luke (12:34), "For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also." We financially support that which we value.

It is through this letter I am informing you that I have accepted another call. I will be the pastor of Bethany Lutheran Church, in Iowa Falls.

As approved by Immanuel's Executive Council my last day, as pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, will be Sunday, December 26, 2021. My farewell sermon will be Christmas Eve.

After December 26th I will not be available to conduct or even participate in such events as funerals, weddings, hospital calls, emergency calls, Camp EWALU, the 2022 National Youth Gathering, or any other functions normally carried out by a pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church.

As we say our goodbyes may you know I love you deeply and will miss you. The 9 ½ years I have served you as pastor, I pray you have witnessed Christ through my words and actions. The Holy Spirit will guide you to a new pastor who will continue to proclaim with you that Jesus is the saving and transforming Son of God. May we depart in Christ's peace.
